Radio Shack HTX-242 Two Meter Mobile Transceiver

I checked out Radio Shacks new HTX-242 2M mobile. The owner's manual is straight forward and includes an easy to follow and handy quick reference card for those who won't RTFM - "read the flipping manual" .It's essentially an upgrade on the HTX-212 with 40 memory channels, dual VFO, DTMF, CTCSS, Auto Memory Store (AMS - a cloning feature), extended Rx and Tx and a bag of the latest communications features. The HTX 242 receives from 136.000 to 174.000 MHz making it possible for me to program the weather channel 162.550 on VFO A and the MRS auto patch on VFO B freeing up two more memory channels for use. The default Tx is 144.000 - 148.000 MHz, but transmit frequencies can easily be expanded by external programming. This enables the use of MARS and CAP frequencies. A reminder: you must have a valid MARS and CAP licence to operate on Military Amateur or Civil Air frequencies. Power output is rated at 45 Watts on high and 10 Watts on low. This extra power on low makes a 1/4 wave mag-mount pretty effective on the fringes of repeater range. I had No problem reaching VE4WPG from Lockport or Selkirk.

The HTX-242 makes an excellent first mobile radio for new Amateurs. Even old timers whose preferences lie with one the big 4 (Icom, Kenwood, Yaesu, Alinco) will have a hard time showing anything but enthusiasm once putting this exceptional rig to the test. It should be generally available at Radio Shack, company and franchise stores, by the end of August. It retails for \$399.00 plus taxes...

CallSigns R Us? by Dave, VE4EF

On July 4, 1996 Farrell Hopwood, President of the RAC announced the formation of an ad hoc working group under the auspices of the CARAB (Canadian Amateur Radio Advisory Board) to examine current call sign assignment policies and make recommendations for future changes. The Call Sign Working Group is comprised of four RAC members (Committee Chair Dave Panting VE4EF, Dennis Livesay VE7DK, Bob Kirkpatrick VE9VAR, Leo Daigle VE2LEO) and four Industry Canada representatives.

Since the activation of the working group, the RAC members have done their best to disseminate information about the project to the amateur community and have solicited response from all licensed amateurs. This was done via written announcements posted on the RAC web site and distributed via e-mail, and The Canadian Amateur magazine

as well as packet bulletins and net announcements across the country. Unfortunately, this initial activity took place during the summer months when most amateur radio clubs are in recess and there is a general hiatus in "on air" activity. While there has been considerable response and discussion from the amateur community at large, it was the CSWG's feeling that the original completion date of September 13 did not allow enough time for public comment. Therefore the deadline for the CSWG to submit it's report to CARAB was extended to December 1 so that the draft policy which follows could be published in this issue of TCA and allow for further input from amateurs until November 22.

Call signs are a contentious and emotional issue for amateurs as to a large extent they determine "who" and "where" we are on the air. The volunteer RAC committee members have been subjected to some interesting, passionate, and even abusive opinions during their work on this subject. As you read the following draft recommendations please bear in mind that they are the best distillation of the opinion received so far but are not in final form and primarily represent solutions to perceived problems. Draft Call Sign Assignment Policy Recommendations

- **%o** Two letter suffix assignment. Waiting lists for two letter calls are currently in effect in some parts of the country and not others and the administration of waiting list criteria is not consistent.
 - { Recommendation: Open new call sign prefix blocks in the VA to VG range across the country as required to eliminate two letter suffix waiting lists.
- Call sign portability/unique call sign prefixes for each province and territory. Canadian amateurs clearly place great value in having unique prefixes attached to each province or territory.
 - { Recommendation: Reinforce the past practice that amateurs who relocate permanently must relinquish their existing calls and acquire a new call in their new geographic area. Amateurs who relocate temporarily must identify "portable VE?" eg. VE4ZF portable VV1
- Massignment of Q code suffixes. In some areas of the country suffixes which may be used as or confused with "Q" codes have been issued.
 - { Recommendation: Call signs with the suffixes "QRA to QTZ" and "QOA to QQZ" should not be issued.
- **%** Use of VE0 prefix for ships. Call signs with the VE0 prefix have been assigned to amateurs operating aboard

- vessels in international waters. There is no apparent basis for these assignments.
- { Recommendations: Assignment of VE0 prefixes should be discontinued.
- { Amateurs operating aboard vessels should use their own call signs "marine mobile"
- Special event prefixes. Special prefixes have been assigned either nation wide or regionally to commemorate significant events and occurrences which may or may not be related to amateur radio. Opinion gathered from Canadian amateurs to this point is virtually unanimous that this practice "has gotten way out of hand".
 - { Recommendation: If additional prefix VA to VG blocks are made available as recommended above, discontinue the practice of assigning national or regional special temporary prefixes
- Mo Special event call signs. Complete special call signs have been assigned to amateurs or clubs operating temporary stations at "special events" which may or may not be radio related. These call signs have included four letter suffixes and suffixes with multiple letters.
 - { Recommendation: That the practice of assigning special event call signs continue as long as they conform to standard ITU format, i.e.. Letter Letter Number Letter (Letter) (Letter).
- Wanity call signs. This has been interpreted as the practice of allowing amateurs to change call signs to some particular call of their choice. This is currently allowed for by IC as long as the new call is available.
 - { Recommendation: This practice should be allowed to continue, although the final report will likely contain more specific guidelines about the issuance of certain types of calls such as single letter suffixes.
- Multiple call signs per amateur. Although there is some feeling in the amateur community that any particular amateur should only hold one call sign there does not seem to be any reason why it should be disallowed. The regulations outline how many stations can be covered by one license, and additional stations require additional licenses. If an amateur wishes to license several stations then each license will carry a different call sign for which the amateur will pay the standard fee.
 - { Recommendation: There should be no arbitrary limit on the number of station licenses (and call signs) any individual amateur can hold.
