

Sixty-three amateur operators who acted COMMUNICATORS during Winnipeg ARES Flood Operations were presented with Certificates of Appreciation at the June97 WARC meeting. Ten individuals and organizations that acted as SUPPORTERS were also presented with Certificates of Appreciation by Winnipeg ARES. A debrief of Flood Operations was held 14AUG97 at RRCC. The twenty-seven amateurs in attendance were a good cross-section of operators from Winnipeg ARES, South Central ARES, and Winnipeg Senior Citizens Radio Club. The WARC DX SLEUTHS Report by Ed, VE4YU

I haven't heard much from other DX Sleuth members on their activities so please excuse me for relating from a lot of my own experiences over the summer months. The band conditions have been volatile to say the least, but, as any true DXer knows, that is when you dig more carefully through that QRN for those weak signals that could produce a good, if not rare, find.

There were several contest activities during June, July and August, that produced some good opportunities to add to your DX list. During several of these, 15M and even 10M were open for brief periods of time. A quick sweep across the 20M band at any time usually gives an indication of propagation. If you are only hearing weak USA signals between 10AM and 10PM and no signals outside North or South America, you can be pretty sure that you won't score very well with DX. Generally, you will find that there is a high QRN level on HF just prior to weather disturbances near your location that clear up somewhat when the disturbance centers on you. Of course if lightning accompanies the storm, you would probably be well advised to curtail activity until the electrical stuff passes.

If USA signals sound strong, try listening between the KWs for distant stations and tune around 15M and 10M between 1400hrs and 1800hrs. The 40M band can be good, when it is open, starting at about 1700hrs. In July I pruned my 40M dipole and was happy to see that it worked much better. In the IARU contest I worked VP8CTR in South Sandwich on 40M CW and it appeared that he was not being heard well in the USA as he was calling CQ often with no replies.

Some stations I worked during contest activity were: VS97BG (special Hong Kong prefix), GU3EJL, CY1TX & CY0NCD (Sable Is.), CY9AA (St. Paul Is.), JY5HX, OJ0/N4GN, CU2/DL3LAB, VP8CTR, FK8GJ, D2HL, plus lots of VKs, ZLs and JAs. So there is DX out there!

Irek, VE4COZ, continues to put VE4 on the map for RTTY enthusiasts and it is surprising how much good DX

can be worked in this mode, contest or otherwise. Since Irek was out of town for the SARTG Scandinavian RTTY test I decided to give it a try. I managed to work 68 stations in the few hours I was active, including about 15 countries. If you have the capability, give this test a go next time. Adam, VE4SN, who doesn't have too much `new' DX to work is pecking away at getting some stations on CW that he doesn't have on that mode. Lee, VE4ANC and Gary, VE4YH, made VE4RAC available during the RAC Canada Day Event. Thanks guys! We are hoping that Norm, VE4EH will get his new Vibroplex keyer into action and add to the too few, active, VE4 CW operators.

<u>Bulletin #97/10 - REPEAT OF A RECENT ARRL</u> BULLETIN

Keep an ear out for VO1 and VO2 call signs during this fall's ARRL Sweepstakes. Canada's Newfoundland-Labrador (NL) Section will be among those that SS participants will have to snag this November on their way to that coveted Clean Sweep Award. The ARRL received formal notification of the change last week from Radio Amateurs of Canada President J. Farrell "Hoppy" Hopwood, VE7RD, although the addition of the NL section actually was approved last year. Some NL hams gave NL as their section in last fall's SS, although the change had not yet been incorporated into the list of SS sections. Joe Craig, VO1NA, of Torbay, Newfoundland, is the Section Manager in NL. RAC Vice President and General Counsel Tim Ellam, VE6SH, said the new section was created "primarily as it was hard to service VO1/2 from the MAR (Maritimes) section due to geography."

The addition of a new section could prove to be a significant challenge for those hoping to work all ARRL and RAC sections, plus VE8/VY1 (a total of 79 multipliers) in the popular fall event. Some Canadian sections already are among the more difficult ones to find and work. (A heads up: Ellam says RAC has also explored the possibility of creating additional new sections north of the border, but no decisions have been reached yet.) The change also means that those who use computerized logging programs will have to add the new section to their program's list of SS sections--just as they had to do last fall with the addition of the Northern New York section.

Bulletin #97/17 - THE QUEEN IN ST. JOHN'S.

St. John's, NF Canada was once again the site of a communications first when Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II transmitted a brief message, via Amateur radio, to the people of the UK. This is the first time a reigning British Monarch has transmitted via the Amateur service.

On Wednesday, June 25th, 1997 the Society of Newfoundland Radio Amateurs (SONRA) arranged the transmission between VO500JC, at Cabot Tower in St. John's, to GB500JC, in Bristol UK in order for the Queen to make a brief transmission. Operators Paul J. Piercey VO1HE, President of SONRA, and Dan Goodwin VO1MX assisted Her Majesty on the Canadian side and Martyn Phillips G3RFX, assisted by Cyril Chapman G2HDR and Robin Thompson G3TKF, was on hand in Bristol to respond on behalf of the people of Great Britain.

Band conditions before the event were quite poor on 20M and it was not known if the contact would be made. 45 minutes before Her Majesty arrived at the site, the Bristol station was quite low in signal strength and audio quality during testing. Once the Queen began her transmission, however, it was almost as if the path opened up and, at 1801 UTC, the contact was made. Martyn's response was quite loud, despite the poor conditions.

The Queen's message was as follows:

"I am speaking to you from Signal Hill National Historic Site, d'ou Guglielmo Marconi recu le premier message radio transatlantique. I am happy to know that Newfoundland and Labrador is still in the forefront of the communications industry, and is working closely with other leaders in this field across the Atlantic."

On the Canadian side, the equipment used was a Kenwood TS-850 SAT, a Heathkit SB-200 amplifier running approximately 400 Watts and a simple wire dipole cut for 20M about 20 feet above the Powder Magazine, an out-building which served as the shack. The UK group, operating from Martyn's home, used a Kenwood TS-950 SDX into a Linear Amp UK amplifier with 400 Watts output and a 3 element tri-band beam at 60 feet.

Signal Hill, in St. John's, is no stranger to communications or to historical firsts in communications. Used as a signaling post to announce approaching ships to St. John's merchants, it was also the site where Guglielmo Marconi received the first wireless transatlantic signal on December 12th, 1901. SONRA is planning to host a celebration to mark the 100th anniversary of that historic event in December 2001.

Bulletin #97/20 - RAC HF BANDPLAN REVIEW

As many of you are aware there are proposals emanating from the U.S. Amateur community which will impact our current RAC HF Band Plans. (See TCA March 1997 Page 36, Feb. 1997 W5WI report, April 1997 CQ page 110, or your Ham Web site). The proposed changes will effect all of us differently, since we are varied in modes, times of operation, and particular HF interests.

The RAC HF Band Plan Committee is looking for committee members (hopefully two from each Province) who would be willing to help evaluate input from from all HF interest groups, be they AM, CW, Digital, SSB, TV, or whatever.

If you are interested in being on the committee, you can send me a resume which I will forward to your Regional Director and RAC President for approval October 1st.

If you wish to contribute but not necessarily be on the committee you could start considering the ramifications of the changes and then put together some recommendations. We will be looking for this input as soon as we have the committee members in place.

Our objective is to formulate a comprehensive and workable HF Band Plan for Canadian Amateurs which takes into consideration Region 1 and 3 HF Band usage.

In the BODY of the message just type the word "name", and the family name of the amateur who's call sign you are looking for.

Example:

name krzypynski

You should receive a return message giving the full name and address and the call sign You can also enter the callsign and receive the name in the reply

Example: call VA5XYZ

The reply should list the full name and address. Other information you can supply to narrow down the search are:

address

city

province

postal code

In other words, the e-mail search works exactly like the search on the aras-sara web site. Since Rene is still perfecting the software, please have a little patience if you encounter any bugs.

at his family hotel. Most participants arrived Friday evening, just in time to begin set up, and to feed the hordes of starving mosquitoes. Our Field Day gang filled most of the rooms in the hotel. That guaranteed that there were no QRM complaints!

There were three stations, all operating on generators. Lee VE4ANC loaned his 50 ft military popup tower. It went up slick as a whistle, with Dan VE4SYG's TET HF beam on top for 20 and 15. We also had a set of VHF beams, and some wire antennas on a 40 ft DMX tower, to cover 80 through 2 meters.

Clouds of mosquitoes convinced everyone to stop for the evening around ten pm Friday. Several of us retired to the bar to enjoy liquid refreshments and munchies. Derek VE4HAY was moving a little slowly Saturday morning. It seems that he closed down the bar, Friday night. We installed the rest of the equipment Saturday morning. There was just enough time to attach coax to the radios, and do some tests before those magic words "CQ FIELD DAY, CQ FIELD DAY" blasted out over the airwaves at 1800Z.

The HF beam was pointed straight south to begin the contest on 20 meters. Later, the W6's and other western states were pouring in, so we rotated the antenna to south westerly. Lee VE4ANC took over a shift around 0200Z on 20 meters, with me, VE4HK logging. We were averaging 1-2 contacts per minute for a few hours. Lots of Arizona, Texas, California, and Utah stations. A rather large crew enjoyed a delicious buffet breakfast at the hotel on Sunday morning. Once our stomachs were satisfied, several of us wandered out to the Field Day site to relieve the night crew. We spent a few more hours calling "CQ Field Day, CQ Field Day" and telling tall tales to one another. Finally, at 1800 UTC, we shut down VE4BB for another year. A few hours to dismantle

everything and load up Derek's truck, and away we went home. I had a special invitation to help VE4HAY unload his truck at VE4WSC. How could I refuse an opportunity to carry tower sections and generators up those stairs. Field Day finally ended for me about 5:30 pm Sunday.

Teen Ham Operator Sabotaged Security Extracted from the Winnipeg Free Press, Wednesday August 6, 1997 (local A-7)

A teenage ham radio operator was sentenced to two years probation yesterday after disabling a Winnipeg shopping centre's security access to the 911 emergency lines. Now 18, he also had approximately \$3,000 worth of ham radio equipment seized for a year and was ordered to perform 100 hours of community service.

"What you did was very serious," provincial court Judge John Enns told the clean-cut, heavy-set youth.

Crown attorney David Soper said the teenager used modified radio equipment to tap into the radio frequency used by Polo Park shopping centre security. He said the youth tied up the security guard's access to the 911 emergency number between Oct. 1, and Dec 5m 1996 by making repeated hang-up phone calls.

He was eventually caught after Manitoba Telephone System security traced the calls.

Industry Canada Petition

The History of Amateur Radio Revisited Condensed and submitted by Ed, VEAYU

Above taken from the 1954 ARRL Handbook and a series of articles produced by George F. W. Reynolds, VE4AJ, who became a silent key in 1996.

`Amateur Radio is a scientific hobby, a means of gaining personal skill in the fascinating art of electronics and an opportunity to communicate with fellow citizens by private shortwave radio'.

So says the opening sentence in the 1954 ARRL handbook that introduces the new ham to the hobby. These words are as true today, 43 years later, as they were then, and as they were at the turn of the century, when experimenters flourished at the news of Marconi proving that messages could be sent by wireless.

By 1912, with numerous government and commercial stations in operation, laws, licenses and wavelength specifications for various services appeared. With no official spokesperson for the amateur organization, the official reaction toward the experimenters was to allow them to use frequencies below 200 meters, which would severely restrict any distant communications. However, amateurs discovered how long distance communications were possible on a sporadic basis and also messages could be sent long distances using relay stations (sound familiar - nets, repeaters). Amateurs began to wonder if some day their signals could span the Atlantic on 200 meters.

In early 1914, Hiram Percy Maxim, a radio experimenter, conceived and launched the American Radio Relay League (ARRL). By 1917 ARRL was just beginning to blossum to unite radio amateurs in the USA when the first world war

curtailed its activities. Of the 6000 amateurs existing then, 4000 served in the armed forces during the war.

Meanwhile, in Canada, amateur radio experimenters were also very active. In February, 1911, the first Amateur Radio Club in Canada was formed. Called the Central Canadian Wireless Club, its secretary wrote to other radio amateurs across Canada promoting the idea of the Winnipeg club becoming the coordinating organization for all Amateurs in Canada, the prototype for a national wireless league. On August 2, 1914, an order in council from Ottawa was issued closing Amateur and other nonessential stations for the duration of the war.

On April 15, 1919, eagerly waiting Canadian Amateurs, were overjoyed to hear that the order in council had been canceled and applications for licensing of Amateur stations could once more be accepted. In Canada, licensing actually began on May 1, 1919, whereas in the USA, Amateurs were not allowed to operate until October 1st.

In Winnipeg, in March 1919, just before licensing was restored, some prospective Winnipeg experimenters formed the first club to be called the Winnipeg Amateur Radio Club.

Future plans also will be to get back on the 144.31 frequency with the FBB Broadcasts for TPK and Winpack users. A landline port will also be in the future plans.


