Y2K Communications

A number of volunteer amateur radio operators will be required in the Winnipeg area to provide various civil authorities with back-up communications networks around New Year's Eve/New Years Day in case of Y2K related communication disruptions.

The City of Winnipeg has already asked for support for Winnipeg Police Service and Emergency Response Service (Fire). Manitoba Hydro needs help with an HF link from their System Control Centre in south Winnipeg to some U.S. utilities.

The RCMP have apparently approached Don Mackinnon for help with links from Winnipeg Tele-comm Centre to 45 Detachments.

Emergency Preparedness Canada is utilizing CFARS stations to provide links from Ottawa to provincial and territorial capitals.

Winnipeg ARES in cooperation with Winnipeg Amateur Radio Club will be having a special meeting Monday 27SEP 1900h at Sturgeon Creek Regional Secondary School on Ness Ave to outline the emergency amateur radio projects set up so far and hopefully recruit some operators.

The History of Amateur Radio Revisited Condensed and submitted by Ed, VE4YU

PART 18 OF A SERIES ON RADIO BROADCASTING HISTORY IN MANITOBA

In the Fall of 1923, radio was used for the first time for communication between an isolated Manitoba mine and Winnipeg. The mine was the Bellvue, situated in the wilderness 30 miles inland from the east shore of Lake Winnipeg and 110 miles northeast of Winnipeg. Mail and supplies reached the mine from Riverton, some 75 miles north of Winnipeg on the west shore of the lake. In summer the route was across the lake by boat and then along a winding river with numerous portages to the mine; in winter, by team across lake ice and then over a rough bush trail to the Bellvue. During the spring break-up, when lake and river ice was melting, and during the fall freeze-up when the ice was forming, the mine was cut off from civilization - plane service into the north was only a hope for the future.

The mine manager wanted to investigate the practicability of radio as a means of all-seasons communication with the city and had ordered a receiver and a 20 watt transmitter from the Acme Magneto and Electrical Company in Winnipeg. The owners of the mine, the American Development Company of New York, had applied for an experimental license, which at that time carried a 9 call, with the idea of getting a commercial license if the test proved successful. The author (George Reynolds) was offered a three-way job as assayer, mine survey helper and radio operator. The radio equipment arrived on the last boat across Lake Winnipeg for the year along with advice in the mail that the license application had been rejected because the company did not have a Canadian charter. It would be necessary to reapply in the name of the manager, a Canadian citizen. In the interim, the author would use his amateur call, 4AG, when operating the set.

On November 2 1923, an emergency arose that necessitated getting the radio operational without delay. The mill foreman's wife, Mrs. E. G. Symms, who was expecting a baby, suddenly developed complications with which the localIndian midwife was unable to cope and a doctor was urgently needed. After unsuccessfully attempting to raise a Winnipeg station, contact was made with Harry Drew, 9EBT, Fargo, North Dakota. He was asked to phone the company's Winnipeg office and have them try and get a doctor to the mine. The company's vice-president, H. V. Hudson, contacted Dr. S. Thompson, the resident doctor in Riverton. The doctor volunteered to try and reach the mine. After a hazardous trip by dog team over newly-formed ice on Lake Winnipeg to Manigotagan on the east shore, he was taken by a guide through the bush to the mine, travelling on horseback. He arrived at Bellvue on November 5 in time to save the mother's life, although the baby was stillborn. Because of their part in getting badly needed medical assistance to the remote community, 4AG and 9EGT were awarded citations by the American magazine 'Popular Radio' for the most outstanding achievement by radio amateurs in 1923. Later the station power was increased to 50 watts to enable regular communication with Winnipeg using the special experimental license 9AD.

When good reception conditions returned in the autumn of 1923. CKY introduced an unusual service to its listeners. Sensitive receivers with directional antennae were installed by M.T.S. at locations in the city that were relatively free from man-made interference. The first spot chosen was in the Fort Rouge district, the second on Atlantic Avenue. When one of the receivers monitored a strong signal from a U. S. broadcaster, it was fed by telephone line to CKY and the received program was put on the air. During the course of an evening, a variety of programs from different U.S. stations might be re-broadcast over CKY. Lowry was continually extolling the excellence of CKY productions yet if an entertaining program was coming through from Denver, Des Moines or elsewhere, the unpaid CKY artist was unceremoniously bumped off the air. In some quarters it was felt that this scheme might be counter- productive in that it would encourage listeners to buy receivers capable of picking up U.S. broadcasts direct in preference to CKY's own offerings.

PROPOSAL TO STREAMLINE THE AUTHORIZATION PROCESS

Industry Canada has released its proposal to streamline the authorization process for the Amateur Radio Service.

In short Industry Canada proposes:

- to make the Amateur Radio Operator Certificate the sole authorization document
- eliminate the radio licence thereby eliminating the licence issuance fee, the short term fee and the \$24 annual renewal fee
- to modify the operator certificate to include the operator's assigned call sign
- to charge a fee (\$60) for user initiated transactions

A cheap and quick mast by Allan, VE4QEW

For awhile the only antenna I had up was a small ¼ wave that was attached to the top of the gable end of the house. I thought there must be a better way. Well when I decided to set up an HF station I knew it was time! I had recently helped to dismantle a station for a silent key and thought that what he had as a end support for a dipole could easily be used as a mast for a small to medium sized vertical. It most likely will not hold up any kind of beam although I admit I didn't even try.

This is a quick way to erect mast and for mine (20 feet) doesn't even need guy wires. I have had a Cushcraft HF9V (a 26' antenna) on top for the past year and have no trouble with it. I did lower it for the big wind storm we had in early April but better safe than sorry and this design makes it simple and quick to raise and lower the antenna.

The setup is fairly simple and the fact that it is a tilt over mast makes lowering and adjusting a breeze.

Materials needed:


- 1- $6 \times 6 \times 14$ Landscape post
- All Wood should be pressure treated
- 2- 2 X 4 X 16'
- 1- 4 X 4 X 1'
- 2 ½ X 12" Bolts with nuts and 4 washers
- 4 ¹/₄ X 7" bolts with nuts and 4 washers

Paint if desired

Method

Start with a 6" X 6" X 14' landscape post. I used a paint-on treatment as well even though it was pressure treated already. Bevel the top in order to shed water. Dig a 4'

deep hole with a post hole digger and put a shovel full of gravel in the bottom for drainage and so the wood will not be sitting directly on the dirt. Put the post in and plumb it vertical. Fill around the sides



with $\frac{3}{4}$ + down gravel tamping it down with a pole as you go. Over fill the hole so there is no mud against the wood and there is a slight slope away from the post. Bore a ½" hole through for the mast pivot about 1 foot down from the top. Drill a hole through both 16' 2 X 4's about 5 feet from one


end. This will be the pivot point. At the far end of the 2X4's bolt the ends together straddling the 4 X 4 block. Bore a suitable sized hole down through the block to act as the antenna support.

Assembly

Put a washer on one of the 12" bolts and slide it

through one of the 2 X 4 pivot holes. Then through the post and then the other 2 X 4. Put on a washer and loosely turn on the nut. Swing the mast to the vertical position and drill



another hole through the assembly about 1' from the bottom of the 2 X 4's. Feed the last bolt through using the remaining washers. Tighten the 2 bolts and you're done.

In order to tilt it down to install or repair your antenna simply loosen the top bolt, remove the bottom bolt and swing the mast over.

Total cost of this mast is under \$50.00 and gives you a sturdy platform 20 feet up on which you can install a variety of antennas.

Common Mistakes We Hams Make. By Eric, VE4EPC

Have you found that you enter a conversation without identifying your station?

If you answered YES you are in violation of rules and regs.

Have you found that during your conversation you have left microsections between keyups?

If you answered YES you have ignored common courtesy.

Have you found that you have broke into an existing conversation to talk to a specific ham and have totally ignored the other party in the original conversation?

If you have answered YES you have ignored common courtesy.

Have you entered a multiparty conversation during peak hours on a popular repeater?

If you answered YES you have contributed to added confusion and the ability of other hams to make a brief call.

Have you had to express your apologies for stepping on someone because of excessive conversations on repeater operations?

If you answered YES you probably realize there are too many people on the frequency and you have only contributed to the confusion.

Have you carried on a lengthy conversation on a repeater with a ham that is only several blocks away?

If you answered YES you probably should be on a SIMPLEX operation.

Have you broke into a conversation with two hams that have been in conversation for less than one minute?

If you answered YES you probably did not monitor the frequency before breaking in or your break was more urgent than the conversation-taking place.

Have you monitored the frequency for any length of time before you broke in?

If you answered YES then you are using correct radio protocol and common courtesy.

Have you kerchunked the repeater without identifying your station?

If you answered YES you are probably testing your equipment or the repeater operations to see if the equipment is working, but you forgot to ID your station.

Have you left your conversation without identifying your station?

If you answered YES you have forgotten to ID your station at the end of your transmission or you where interrupted with your contact and left on hold.

Have you had conversations on topics of religion or politics and then apologized for the conversation?

If you answered YES then maybe the topics are to sensitive and should be avoided and therefore not warrant an apology.

Have you operated from a handheld at low power and received a poor signal report and you still try to maintain communications?

If you answered YES have you explored the reasons why your communication is of poor quality and corrected the problem before trying to maintain communication?

If you answer YES to any of the above, YOU may be in Violation of "Rules and Regs" and common radio courtesy. (With the exception of one question.)

A suggestion would be to evaluate yourself and if you fall into any of these categories, correct them before you influence new hams coming onstream as well as getting yourself into a bad habit before it becomes second nature.

Packet BBS Call Sign Change By Werner VE4UA

The VE4UA bbs has now changed callsigns as of the 4th of May 1999, it has changed to VE4BBS. The alias of the BBS will be Mbbbs My BPQ node UABOX with a callsign of VE4UA-3 will still remain the same.

You can connect to VE4BBS via VE4PKT on 145.070 or the nodes...and there are ports on 144.31 direct, and 145.090 via VE4RAG....Right now we have the nodes confused, as they point the VE4BBS connects in the direction of Haywood, MB so if you have difficulty in connecting to the BBS, the try to connect to my node first, VE4UA-3, the issue the BBS or C VE4BBS command and it will take you to the bulletin board.

Some of you may not be aware, but Allan VE4LOM, shut down his BBS when he was using the call VE4BBS and rather than leave the call empty, I applied for same to keep the call active and use it for the Main forwarding BBS here in Winnipeg. Calling all sailors

DIANE TURBIDE in Burlington

When D'Arcey Hilgenberg is planning a weekend barbecue at her home in Hamilton, Bermuda, she'll often make a quick call to her father, Herb, to ask him what kind of

weather she can expect. Herb Hilgenberg, grumbling good-naturedly that he is not in the business of planning social events, will provide her with a reliable forecast for the next few days. Oddly enough, Hilgenberg is based not in the Caribbean but in Burlington, Ont, 50 km west of Toronto. In fact, Hilgenberg is not in the business of weather predictions at all. The daily forecasts that he provides for sailors cruising the Caribbean or crossing the Atlantic are his hobby-albeit an all consuming one. From his 2.5 by three metre windowless basement office, Hilgenberg uses satellite dishes, two computers and radio equipment to capture and analyze meteorological data from around the world, then broadcasts his conclusions to a loyal following at sea. "There is nobody better at analyzing satellite imagery and determining real weather conditions," says Capt. Andrew Bass of the U.S. Naval Academy Sailing Squadron in Annapolis, Md. "Without him, life at sea would be a lot more dangerous."

An amateur operating out of his old laundry room ("My wife prefers the washing machine upstairs, anyway," Hilgenberg shrugs) gives better high-seas reports than official weather sources? According to thousands of pleasure sailors and commercial boaters, the answer is yes. Using high-frequency single sideband radio, Hilgenberg makes contact with 40 to 70 boats a day, advising on conditions and suggesting safe routes. Hundreds of other boaters listen in. One testimonial from Joe Bass, skipper of the U.S.-based Sea Bass, was unequivocal: "I've sailed 100,000 sea miles, but if Herb told me to jump up and down and bark like a dog, I would."

The man who inspires such loyalty is a 60-year-old retired engineer, a trim, meticulous figure who recently gave up a 25-year-old pipe-smoking habit but still downs about 10 cups of coffee a day. Gem man-born, he learned to sail in St. John's, Nfld., where he lived until he was 19. After graduating in engineering from the University of Toronto, he married his Swiss wife, Brigitte, in 1963, earned an MBA and set-fled in Burlington. Hilgenberg worked for computer companies while sailing in races in his spare time. In 1982, the couple and their two daughters, D'Arcey, then 14, and Cathleen, then 6, embarked on a trip to the Virgin Islands aboard their 12-m sailboat Southbound II. leaving Beaufort, N.C., they soon found themselves in gale conditions, 60 knot winds and nine metre waves. They avoided disaster, but the experience spurred Hilgenberg to a deeper study of weather. "I thought, how can a sane man take his family out on the high seas and risk everything?" he says. "There simply wasn't enough information available."

When the family moved to Bermuda in 1984, Hilgenberg started his marine forecasting on a part-time basis. It was there that the U.S. navy's Bass first started listening to what everybody called "The Herb Show." "The U.S. government was spending millions of dollars on oceanographic and meteorological data," recalls Bass with a laugh, "and here

was this part-time hobbyist beating them hands down." It was the start of a fruitful relationship: in April, Hilgenberg will give his third annual lecture at the U.S. Naval Academy Sailing Squadron. This year, he will focus on unusual weather, including the infamous El Nino factor, which Hilgenberg dismisses as a "vast oversimplification of a complex set of patterns."

Since his return to Burlington in 1994, Hilgenberg's "hobby" takes up about eight hours a day, seven days a week. He begins analyzing various sources of weather data-including restricted files he is allowed to get from the U.S. navy's database-at 11 a.m. Then at 3 p.m., he begins a three-hour broad cast. "I help people understand what they're going to experience," Hilgenberg says. "I tell them that if you do this, you might face six hours of bad weather instead of 18. If, at the end of the day, they tell me 'Herb, you called that one exactly,' that's my reward."

Almost his only reward, it appears. Hilgenberg offers his service free, although grateful sailors send unsolicited donations that cover most of his \$10,000 annual costs. His home is filled with plaques, awards, gifts and mementoes. Weather widow Brigitte, herself a ham operator, serves coffee to boaters who turn up unannounced on the doorstep.

She also handles the voluminous mail, some from people whom Hilgenberg has had a direct hand in rescuing. last May, the U.S. Coast Guard in Miami sent a letter of commendation for his assistance in locating a disabled boat and guiding it through a 36 hour ordeal -- one of many such stories. Another case involved a British man in U.S. waters whose wife of 30 years died of an aneurysm on board. After a nearby ship removed the body, the coast guard, worried that the distraught man might commit suicide, asked Hilgenberg to maintain steady contact with him on the three-week trip back to Britain. Says Hilgenberg: "I feel a commitment to all these people."

So much commitment, in fact, that he has had only one day off since last June. After much persuasion, Hilgenberg's wife recently dragged him off to a Sunday matinee. The movie? Titanic.
