

TREASURERS REPORT

Amateurs will be required to notify Industry Canada with in one month of an address change. Radio Inspectors will now be allowed to issue a ticket for a minor infraction of the Radio Act with enforcement by the Province of the offender. This ticket regulation is now in effect in Ontario, Manitoba, P.E.I, and New Brunswick. Amateur Radio Service Centre (ARSC) will now be a single point of service for Amateur Radio and applications and station licenses have started to be processed through ARSC.

The call sign data base with operator qualifications and the available call sign data base are now available on the RAC web site.

Introduction

Effective June 1, 1999, all amateur licensing activities, e.g. the processing of amateur radio station licence applications, changes of mailing address, requests for special event or special prefix call signs, the issuance of amateur radio operator certificates, etc.., will be carried out from a central location: the <u>Amateur Radio Service Centre</u> in Ottawa.

How to Obtain an Operator's Certificate

Please consult Radiocommunication Information Circular 24 (RIC-24) <u>Information on the Amateur Operator's Certifi-</u> <u>cate Examinations</u>.

Certificate Examinations

There are two routes open to candidates wishing to obtain the amateur operator's certificate (Basic, Morse code (5 w.p.m.), Morse code (12 w.p.m.) and Advanced Qualifications): (1) they may be examined either by a delegated examiner; or (2) by the radio inspector at the local district office of Industry Canada.

Accredited Examiners

Accredited examiners are available in many areas to give the Morse code and written examinations. They may be contacted through amateur radio clubs, technical schools or the <u>Amateur Radio Service Centre</u>. Information regarding delegated examiners can be found in Radiocommunication Information Circular 1 (RIC-1), <u>Guide for Examiners Accredited to Conduct Examinations for the Amateur Radio Operator's Certificate.</u>

How to Obtain a Licence

Complete the Amateur Radio Station Licence Application form, which is available from the <u>Amateur Radio</u> <u>Service Centre</u>. Note: A licence for a station in the amateur service can be issued to a person who holds the Basic Qualification or higher class of radio operator's certificate. When completing the section 'Personal Choice of Call sign', please consult the <u>Radio Amateurs of Canada (RAC) call signs database</u> to confirm what call signs are available to increase the chances of our assigning you the call sign of your choice. If you do not indicate your choice or if your three choices are not available, we will automatically issue you the next available call sign. Call sign will be issued using a prefix based on where the applicant resides. Prefixes currently used for assignment are in accordance with the following table:

The application, along with the appropriate radio licence fee, must be sent by mail to the <u>Amateur Radio Service Centre</u>. For the first year, the licence fees are prorata based on the remaining months of the fiscal year. Refer to the following table to determine the fee to be submitted with your application:

The History of Amateur Radio Revisited Condensed and submitted by Ed, VE4YU

PART 19 OF A SERIES ON RADIO BROADCASTING HISTORY IN MANITOBA

In 1921, amateurs had succeeded in conquering the Atlantic using low power on short waves. By 1924, the old concept of ultrahigh power and long wavelengths for transoceanic communication had been abandoned by the commercial radio companies. A mad scramble was now on to stake out claims in what had formerly been the Amateur Radio ghetto below 200 meters. At the 1924 Washington Radio Conference, to which Canada was a signatory, the short wave (high frequency) spectrum was apportioned between the various radio services. Amateurs were granted band segments at 80, 40, 20, 10 and 5 meters. With intercontinental contacts a daily occurrence, a hurried decision was made to adopt unofficial national prefixes. Canadian hams began using C.

Broadcasters were happy to read in the report of the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the year ending March 31, 1924, that the department was relaxing the ban on direct advertising, to see whether advertising could be handled in such a way as to make it acceptable to broadcast listeners. The necessity for this change in policy can be

seen in the figures for CKY operations for the first six months. Overall costs were \$3,119 while revenue from indirect advertising was only \$1,806.

The most interesting local event in broadcasting in 1924 was the granting of phantom radio license, CNRW, to the Canadian National Railways. A phantom station was, like an amateur broadcasting station, uniquely Canadian. The holder of a phantom station license did not own a broadcast plant, but purchased air time from a licensed broadcaster and used its phantom station license to identify its programs.

Sir Henry Thornton, then President of the CNR, had developed the idea of establishing a chain of radio stations across Canada which were either owned by the railway or which operated under phantom radio licenses. These stations produced high quality programs that could be picked up on the radio equipped CN transcontinental trains for the entertainment of the traveling public. It was the first Canadian radio network and proved to be immensely popular with listeners in all parts of the country. In Winnipeg, the CNR leased time from CKY and broadcast using the call CNRW. This provided CKY with substantial revenue and did not violate Lowry's strongly held principle that there should be only one broadcast outlet in each province.

Over the years there have been two radio broadcasting stations in Manitoba, one publicly owned and one privately owned, that have had the same callsign, CKY. In 1947, the federal government issued a policy statement that, in future, issuance of broadcast licenses to provincial agencies would not be permitted.

On January 23, 1948, the Hon. William Morton, Minister of Telephones for Manitoba, announced that CKY had been sold to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation for \$200,000. CKY operated as a CBC outlet until September 3, 1948, when a 50,000 watt CBC transmitter near Carmen, Manitoba, went into service with the callsign CBW.

Annual Simulated Emergency Test (SET)

The RAC Field Organization is inviting all Radio Amateurs to participate in a Simulated Emergency Test (SET). We feel it is very important to demonstrate the cohesion between Amateur Radio Emergency Services (ARES) groups and National Traffic System (NTS), as well as to demonstrate to served agencies and the public what services can be provided under simulated emergency conditions.

The main weekend for the 1999 SET is Oct 2-3, but ARES teams or nets may conduct their exercises anytime between September 1 and November 30. Consult with your Section Emergency Coordinator before settling on a date as a SET works best if there is active participation in a number of areas throughout a Section, and involving more than one local net, if possible.

Whether you are part of a new or experienced ARES group, the SET is a great opportunity to learn or practice useful skills in traffic handling, net operation and emergency communication management. IMPORTANT

No cards should be submitted unless properly sorted and accompanied by a duly completed current ARRL DXCC List - Order #7067 available only from ARRL at US\$3. This also contains complete rules. Cards must be arranged by band, then by mode, and be listed on the form exactly as arranged. The list indicates 81 prefixes for which QSL cards are not eligible for field checking, and should be submitted to ARRL.

An appointment should be made if you wish to deliver your cards in person. Bring with you all requested items. Cards should be sent only by courier or registered mail, securely packed in a carton that is reusable for their return. A money order payable to ARRL in US funds, a stamped envelope addressed to ARRL with sufficient postage (Canadian 55 cent stamp), and funds for return courier or registered mail should be included. Neither RAC nor ARRL are responsible for cards lost or damaged in transit or in the hands of a Field Representative.

Thanks again to all of you for your time and we promise you: We will NOT be doing the Pan Am Marathon next year! Silent Key


> MICHAEL (MIKE) PURA - VE4MP August 19th, 1999


